

Example Abstract 1: MFRM

This was accepted for the 2023 conference. There are three versions of this. The first is the complete abstract that was accepted. The second version is lacking the background explanation so I would expect it to receive a lower score. The third version has been rewritten to incorporate a lot of technical jargon. I would expect this abstract to be given a fairly low score by reviewers. The plain text version is intended to illustrate what can happen when a Word document is converted to plain text.

Example Abstract 2: Cloze Elide

This abstract was accepted for the conference several years ago. It contains in-text citations, but no reference list. This is because there was no separate data entry box for a reference list back then, so a reference list used up a valuable portion of the word count.

Example Abstract 3: Reading Workshop

This is not a real abstract from the conference, it was written to illustrate a practice-oriented workshop proposal on a theme related to Example Abstract 2. In a practice-oriented workshop, it is still necessary to cite existing literature for background and to clearly explain what the audience will see.

Iterative Intentionality and Synergizing Interlanguage

These were both written by an AI chatbot. The terms *iterative intentionality* and *synergizing interlanguage* are meaningless buzzwords.
