At this time, I happened to be in the final stages of my doctoral research. Kathleen generously offered constructive feedback on my entire dissertation, which was especially helpful given I did not have sufficient mentors who could check my work in English at my own institution in Japan. I don't think anyone can take for granted someone who can volunteer such help and critical expertise.

I would therefore like to nominate Kathleen for the Lifetime Achievement Award. As she has reached out to many of us in our community, I am sure others also have various stories which support her candidacy.

Kathleen continuously works towards the advancement of an equitable work environment and society through her thinking, teaching, and practice in and out of the classroom. Besides all of the actions she takes to advocate for diversity and equity in her university's instructional and hiring practices, she is the definition of walking the talk.

Kathleen leads with humility and grace, always striving to use her power to bring scholars from traditionally marginalized communities into the spotlight. She co-edited the groundbreaking work, "Foreign Female English Teachers in Japanese Higher Education: Narratives From Our Quarter," highlighting an under-researched population in English language teaching. As incoming chair of the mentorship committee at JALT, she is extending the work she has been doing for many years behind the scenes, without recognition, in patiently and assiduously mentoring early career researchers facing systemic and other barriers.

Kathleen has worked not only in English but also in Japanese language teaching contexts, advocating for the establishment of program and hiring practices that more effectively reflect and support the populations served. For example, in bringing forward the hiring of a non-Japanese person to teach Japanese language in her university, she was able to educate colleagues and the institution as a whole on native-speakerism in ways that has had lasting impacts.

For the many ways that she has had a powerful and long-term impact on the robustness and inclusivity of the field of language teaching in Japan, Kathleen Brown is the clear choice for recipient of the 2023 JALT Lifetime Achievement Award. --Yaya Yao
